January's Theme: Otherness

"Otherness" is the name we give the experience of coming up to the limits of our privilege, whatever it may be. Some of us are given more privilege than others based on our identity of gender, sexual orientation, race, language, economic class or age. We all have multiple identities and we may be privileged in some of them and not in others.

One of the functions of privilege is that it usually feels like "This is normal." The experience of being white, feels normal to white people and therefore normative to everyone. An experience outside that "norm" gets labeled "otherness." One of my friends in academia shared something he heard an African American student say, "Privilege means that your history is a required class, and my history is an elective."

I think that Martin Luther King was the most significant figure who "woke" mainstream America up to this issue of privilege. Obviously not everyone listened then nor do they all listen today. I think it is important for us to be open to the notion that another person's experience in life may be very different from our own. That difference does not, and cannot, make their experience less valid and certainly doesn't make them less human.

Our assumptions are so ingrained into us, all of us. It is very hard to become aware of our world view that we may have taken for granted our whole lives. And yet that awareness is the first step to change. As Martin Luther King noted that no one can truly be called "other" in America who was born within its boundary. Yet far too often people are made to feel that way. Let take risks to grow, to understand, and to reach other with love to everyone regardless of who they may be.

STEWARDSHIP CORNER

As we start the new year, many of us take time to reflect upon the past 12 months and the status of our personal connections, jobs, health, and finances. Some of us may be concerned about money at the beginning of the year, especially if we are among the many Americans who tend to over-indulge during the holiday season. There are also many cultural, social, and marketing pressures that make the value, possession, and uses of money challenging throughout the year.

According to Lauren Tyler Wright, nurturing a healthy relationship with money comes from reflecting honestly on our attitudes about money, consumer behaviors, motivations for spending, and our needs vs. desires for possessions and wealth.

In her book on "*Giving – The Sacred Art: Creating a Lifestyle of Generosity*," Wright suggests:

Money can be used as a tool to celebrate life and increase joy rather than being a source of contention or stress. The key is to have a proper, skillful relationship with money—neither fearing it nor craving it, but respecting it and the power it can have in our lives and in the lives of others...In fact, through skillful giving, money can be transformed from a profane object into a sacred tool for achieving good.

Money can cultivate the worst in people, or it can bring out the best. If financial worries create conflict in your life or interfere with your desire to be generous, you may benefit from simple technical advice on personal finances and planning. Many of us, however, may also benefit from a deeper exploration of the role that our high-consumption, materialistic society plays in our financial decisions. There are many excellent resources available in the local library and on-line, including the UUA website:

Challenging Inequality – Discussions on Social Justice

Challenging extreme inequality is a moral imperative. The escalation of inequality undergirds so many injustices which our faith movement is committed to addressing: from economic injustice to mass incarceration; from migrant injustice to climate change; from sexual and gender injustice to attacks on voting rights. The Social Justice Committee will be offering a deep discussion of this complex and inspiring subject and the many ways to engage at personal, congregational, local, state, national and global levels in January, beginning January 8, at the 9:30 a.m. hour. Join us!

Sacred Conversations for Racial Justice: A Series of 4 Saturday Seminars

Introduction: A 2015 Action of Immediate Witness by the Unitarian Universalist Association recognized that racism is an institutionalized pattern reaching far beyond any single incident or person and voiced our denominational support for Black Live Matter as a movement and took a stance in response to this reality: the United States was built on a legacy of slavery, racism, and oppression that continues to take new, ever-changing forms. To say that "black lives matter" doesn't mean that black lives are more important than other lives, or that all lives don't matter. The systemic devaluing of Black lives calls us to bear witness, even as we acknowledge that oppression takes many intersecting forms. So, what are you going to do about it?

In a public letter to all ministers and congregations, UUA President Peter Morales provided guidance in the work ahead as our nation, our communities, and the most vulnerable among us face an uncertain future. He states that, while the temptation to 'normalize' the situation is great, it is irresponsible folly to act as though we are in a normal transition between administrations. He encourages us to provide sanctuary in the broadest and richest sense of the term and to resist human rights violations in active ways.

To implement this guidance, Susan Leslie, UUA Congregational Advocacy and Witness Director, Multicultural Growth & Witness Staff Team, suggests several actions you can take:

- Listen in to the New Year's Eve service being held by Rev. William Barber at the Metropolitan AME Church in Washington, D.C. It will be livestreamed at 9 p.m. CS time. Rev. Barber is the author of our Common Read for 2017 and the founder of the coalition, Repairers of the Breach. During the service, three moral declarations will be made about making a moral decision to enlist in the fight against injustice, a call for a

race and poverty audit of America, and a call for a national Moral Revival Poor People's Campaign. To connect: <http://www.breachrepairers.org/livestream>

- Meet at the church at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, January 21, to car pool to Austin to join those marching to the capitol FOR social justice, FOR kindness, FOR equality of opportunity, FOR love. This is a sister event to the Women's March on Washington taking place in D.C.

1. The name of the organization.
2. A one-sentence description of the organization for the ballot.
3. The organization's Web site.

A list of the qualified nominations with links to their websites will appear in April. In May, at our Annual Meeting, FUUCSA members will mark their choices on a ballot. The nine organizations with the highest votes will be assigned a month, and as the date approaches, the coordinator and the nominator will promote Share the Plate. Note: There will be no Share the Plate in January as the congregation is collecting memberships and other funds for UUSC.

Church Communications – What’s the Dif?

The church communicates in many, many ways to let people know what’s going on. Our “official” modes of communication are the Newsletter and our [What’s Happening?](#), both sent out via Mail Chimp to members and guests alike. There’s also the Sunday Order of Service insert, and the bulletin boards in the Fellowship Hall that provide timely information and updates. These modes of communication are maintained by the church office and staff.

But we have a number of unofficial methods of communication which are church member generated, where information is put out or exchanged by members or committee chairs. One of these is “First UU Announce” which is a Yahoo Group that people must subscribe to – unlike our Mail Chimp, where people are automatically subscribed through the church office. If you are interested in joining “First UU Announce” please send a request for invitation to membership@uusat.org and I will send you the link to join. Two key things to know about “First UU Announce”, first it is moderated and all messages are approved by designated moderators, second, it is an information “out only” system, not a chat room. Only important information about church events is put out.

Subscribing to “First UU Announce” will add to the number of emails you receive (the bane of modern existence) but as the information is moderated, it isn’t normally overwhelming. And, you can unsubscribe any time you wish!

Committee on Ministry

The Committee on Ministry, which consists of five voting members, focuses on supporting and monitoring the ministry of the congregation and assisting and supporting the minister. Members of the committee serve for a term of three years, with two new members chosen each of two years and one chosen the third year. Members are chosen from a list prepared by the Leadership Committee in collaboration with the minister and elected by the congregation at the annual Congregational meeting. Current members include Don Hymel, Martha Cooley, Vanessa Lucio, Nancy Pridgen, and Troy Peters. Reverend Joshua Snyder serves as a member ex

officio. The committee meets once a month and meetings are announced to the congregation. A portion of each meeting is open to the members of the church.

The Committee on Ministry exists to strengthen and improve relations between the congregation and the minister, to ensure that the congregation is aware of the diversity of ministerial responsibility, to clarify expectations and priorities for both the minister and church members, and to advocate for the minister with the board on programs dealing with education, professional development, and funding.

While the committee exists to facilitate communication between the minister and church members, it does not exist to eliminate direct communication, nor is it part of the committee's charter to bring unattributed criticism – positive or negative – through its members to the minister. In order to carry out the committee members' role as communication facilitators, the committee has developed a simple form designed to initiate dialogue. This form will be available in each pew, and also may be filled out online at the First Unitarian Universalist Church of San Antonio. 

January 1: “Radical Hospitality: Erasing Otherness” - Dr. Sheri Phillabaum
Today we will bid a final farewell to 2016 and look forward to a 2017 of ever increasing unity and radical hospitality, within our church community and in our everyday lives. We’ll look into and question some of the assumptions that lead us to divide ourselves into groups of “us,” and “other.”

January 8: “On Being Illiterate” – Rev. Josh

Brad Warner teaches us how to take a fresh look at the old theist vs. atheist debate using his trademark humor and Gen X Buddhist perspective.

January 29: “At the Crossroads of Comfort and Justice: A White Black Lives of UU Ally's Perspective” – Maggi Joseph

This sermon was inspired by my experiences at GA 2016 where I encountered the Black Lives of UU program track and had something of an epiphany about the persistence of white supremacy. And also where I experienced being an “officially” disabled person, needing a rollator to get around. I found myself experiencing epiphanies from both a privileged and discounted perspective. It is uncomfortable to confront these issues directly; how much discomfort are we prepared to endure for the sake of justice?
